

AKHS,T is a well established and respected healthcare system in Tanzania with significant contributions in the following areas:

Quality Services: Through its high quality, internationally accredited, teaching Hospital in Dar es Salaam and 20 integrated outreach centres across the country, AKHS,T provides quality healthcare to over 500,000 patients annually. A leader in tertiary medicine, the Aga Khan Hospital, Dar es Salaam, offers quality programmes in cardiology, oncology, neurosciences and other specialties to allow Tanzanians to receive the very best treatment at home in Tanzania.

Health Sciences Education: The Aga Khan Hospital is a teaching site for the Aga Khan University Post Graduate Medical Education programmes, which are offered annually in Family Medicine, Internal Medicine and Surgery. There are currently 21 residents in training. The Hospital admits a total of 28 interns each year who are recommended by the Ministry of Health, Community Development, Gender, Elderly and Children (MoHCDGEC). The Hospital also conducts training for nurses enrolled at the Aga Khan University School of Nursing and Midwifery.

Access: AKHS,T is committed to its mission to provide greater access for its patients. This is addressed by not only creating geographical access through the outreach health centres but also by providing financial access through the growing patient welfare programme. In 2017, AKHS,T provided direct welfare of TZS 2.3 billion (\$1 million).

We are all eagerly awaiting completion of the ongoing expansion of the Aga Khan Hospital, which, when completed, will see the establishment of a high end tertiary and academic medical centre in Tanzania. This facility will be among the best-known medical institutions in the developing world and will provide a high standard of clinical programmes and quality care to all Tanzanians alike.

As we reach these milestones, I express my deep gratitude to the dedicated staff of AKHS,T, who across Tanzania provide outstanding care and service to the population and without whom none of this would be possible. Each one of them is doing remarkable work for which I say Asante Sana! 

We employ over 1,200 staff across the country thereby contributing to the development of human capital across Tanzania. The tertiary level clinical programmes enable Tanzanians to access quality healthcare in the country thereby no longer requiring travel abroad. 

SUSTAINABILITY

AKHS,T is a not-for-profit institution that generates revenue for sustainability of its operations and regular improvement of technology to enable it to provide quality healthcare. The institution ensures equitable access to quality healthcare through its differential pricing policy that enables it to provide the same quality of services at subsidized prices in selected geographical areas. AKHS,T, through its welfare programme, supported close to 5,000 patients in 2017, disbursing assistance in the amount of TZS 2.3 billion (\$1 million).

The welfare programme is funded through revenues and donations received from corporate partners and well-wishers. Demand for welfare support is increasing each year requiring continued support from donors. The hospital offers several other initiatives in collaboration with its partners, including free medical screening camps, such as Heart Health, Well Women, Oncology Camps, Breast Cancer Screening Camp, etc.

INCREASED ACCESS

AKHS,T's "hub and spoke" model has an innovative architecture that emphasizes optimal utilisation of scarce healthcare resources giving increased access to a wider population at lower cost. Also, preventative and post-acute care and follow-up can be administered more efficiently without the need for unnecessary travel. The integrated health systems approach aims to supplement the government's efforts in providing healthcare resources, especially in the urban and rural areas, by making specialised quality services more accessible and affordable. AKHS, T has embarked on an ambitious programme of enhancing its outreach activities through the establishment

of 35 outreach health facilities and comprehensive medical centres. These centres will be connected to a "hub" through a continuum of care approach, a common IT system and importantly, through e-health. AKHS, T is currently implementing an e-health/telemedicine strategy that will also include public sector institutions. E-health has proven beneficial not only from a delivery of care standpoint, but also for learning purposes, and is instrumental in breaking barriers resulting in the isolation of healthcare practitioners.


NATIONAL PRIORITIES


AKHS,T establishes programmes that respond directly to national priorities including non communicable diseases, mother and child health, advanced diagnostics etc, enabling us to provide the very best services in – country and to reverse medical tourism. For example, the start of the cardiology and oncology programmes in 2014 have not only saved hundreds of lives but have also saved valuable foreign exchange.

This framework also applies to medical education and allied health training where residents and other professionals rotate between hubs for tertiary healthcare training and spokes for primary care placements. Physicians are able to train residents in multiple sites at OHCs for exchange of knowledge and sharing of experiences for improved delivery and impact of health services.

CONTINUUM OF CARE – INTEGRATED HEALTH SYSTEM

AKHS,T's continuum of care model has an innovative architecture that emphasizes optimal utilisation of scarce healthcare resources. The model links the various tiers of healthcare in a unified continuum that enables the Hub (AKH-D) to provide specialty services to underserved communities through the spokes (Outreach Health Facilities), resulting in increased access to a wider population at much lower costs. Also, preventative and post-acute care and follow-up can be administered more efficiently without the need for unnecessary travel outside of Tanzania.







PARTNERSHIP WITH JUBILEE INSURANCE



In an effort to address the poor health outcomes across East Africa and inadequate healthcare financing structures, the Aga Khan Hospital, Dar es Salaam, has partnered with Jubilee Insurance Company of Tanzania Limited (JICT), a project company of the Aga Khan Fund for Economic Development, to design a unique and affordable insurance package for treatment at the Aga Khan Hospital and outreach facilities. Jilinde Afiya (Protect Your Health) aims at improving population health by providing access to primary healthcare and specialist care.

PARTNERSHIP WITH RECONSTRUCTING WOMEN INTERNATIONAL & MUHIMBILI NATIONAL HOSPITAL





Every year, many women and children in East Africa fall victim to injuries that leave them disfigured and/or disabled. These injuries, which may be the result of accidents or violence, make women vulnerable to stigmatization and isolation.


To address the needs of such women and children in Tanzania, the Aga Khan Health Service Tanzania (AKHS,T) established a partnership with Reconstructing Women International (RWI) based in New York and Muhimbili National Hospital (MNH).

GOALS & OUTCOMES

Since the establishment of this partnership in 2016, over 100 women and children have undergone life-changing surgery free of cost.

More than a dozen local surgeons and surgical trainees have benefited from teaching and mentorship.

In 2017 alone, TZS 400 million (\$178,000) were spent on reconstructive surgeries.



GOAL #1:

Surgically restore form and functior to injured women and children.

GOAL #2:

Build reconstructive surgery expertise through training of local surgeons and residents

GOAL #3:

Encourage prevention of domestic violence and accidental burns.

The next camp in Dar es Salaam will be held during Fall of 2018. With the expansion of Aga Khan Hospital, Dar es Salaam, and an increased number of operating rooms and beds, surgery will be offered to a larger number of patients.

The Joining Hands Initiative (JHI) 2012 - 2015

The Joining Hands Initiative: Improving Maternal,
Newborn and Child Health (JHI:MNCH) was implemented
for a period of three years (25th January 2012 to 31st
March 2015) and was funded by Global Affairs- Canada
(GAC) and the Aga Khan Foundation Canada. The
implementation was carried out by the Aga Khan Health
Service, Tanzania (AKHS,T) in collaboration with the
Ministry of Health, Aga Khan University (AKU) and
Aga Khan Foundation (AKF) through a Public Private
Partnership (PPP) approach.

JHI contributed to the improved MNCH by focusing on improving quality of and access to MNCH services; increasing utilisation of MNCH services, improving community practices, knowledge sharing and exchange on MNCH. The project also piloted innovations, such as family medicine, eHealth (mHealth and teleconsultations) and nurse-midwife franchising.



The GAC grant of TZS 23 billion (\$10 million) allowed the institution to work in 15 districts across 5 target regions in Tanzania namely - Mwanza, Dodoma, Iringa, Mbeya and Morogoro.

IMPACT on Quality of Life: Mwanza – Maternal & Child Health Project

Based on positive reviews from these outcomes, AKHS,T along with other AKDN partners is implementing a new 4-year grant (2017 to 2021), TZS 27 billion (\$12million), dedicated to improving access, utilisation, quality and capacity building in 80 public health facilities. The project, which was developed in consultation with the MOHCDGEC, will target over 1 million beneficiaries.

EDUCATION

The Aga Khan Hospital, Dar Es Salaam (AKH-D) is a teaching hospital with several training components.

Postgraduate Medical Education (PGME)

The Aga Khan University Medical College-East Africa Postgraduate Medical Education programme (AKU MC-EA PGME) in Dar es Salaam offers 3 training programmes – Family Medicine, Internal Medicine and General Surgery. The residents receive a Masters of Medicine degree upon successful completion of the 4-year training programme. AKHS,T and AKU have invested TZS 2.6 billion (\$1.1 million) in these programmes. Residents in training do not pay any tuition and at the same time receive a stipend. AKHS,T is the primary training site for the residents.

Continuing Medical Education (CME)

AKHS,T organises free monthly Continuing Medical Education (CME) sessions for all doctors in Tanzania. This allows the medical fraternity to exchange ideas and learn about new technologies and procedures. Annually, 3,000 doctors benefit from these programmes.

With use of information technology, we are also able to reach out to colleagues in OHCs and PMCs within and outside the region. The CMEs give attendees credit hours, which are soon going to be mandatory for retention of licensure by medical practitioners.

The ultimate goal of the CME programme is to ensure that doctors remain competent, confident and compassionate throughout their professional careers, setting standards for good medical practice. However, an important outcome of these CMEs is the increased awareness of external physicians regarding technology, professional competencies and facilities available at AKH-Dar, resulting in increased patient referrals for specialised services. There has also been an increased demand for short-term hands-on training in different departments/ sections at the hospital.

Capacity Building

A key objective of AKHST's international partnership arrangements is to provide opportunities to Tanzanian healthcare professionals to receive training at international institutions in advanced clinical programmes such as cancer surgeries, palliative care, minimally invasive surgery and other specialties. These training opportunities allow health professionals in turn, to initiate the programmes required. Breast surgeries were started for the first time in Tanzania as a result of this programme.

PARTNERSHIP WITH AGENCE FRANÇAISE DE DÉVELOPPEMENT



A global Memorandum of Understanding between AKDN and Agence Française de Développement (AFD) has allowed social development agencies of the AKDN to receive long term financing for various projects on concessionary basis from AFD.

For the Phase II development of AKHS,T, a concessionary loan for the amount of TZS 123 billion (\$53.5 million) was agreed with AFD in 2014. This financing will be matched by an AKDN contribution of TZS 67 billion (\$30 million) to undertake a major expansion of the Aga Khan Hospital in order to establish it as the premier academic medical centre in Tanzania and also to launch 35 outreach health facilities across Tanzania. This will see the establishment of a truly integrated health system.



There is commonality between the developmental oriented goals of AKDN and AFD - France's inclusive public development bank AFD commits financing and technical assistance to projects that genuinely improve everyday life, both in developing and emerging countries and in the French overseas provinces. In keeping with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, AFD works in many sectors to assist with transitions towards a safer, more equitable, and more sustainable world: a world in common.

Given the commonality of objectives, AFD and AKDN are natural partners. The strength of the relationship is based on a common focus to ensure true development and a genuine desire to invest in the social uplifting and improvement of the quality of life of peoples, communities and countries. Today, the partnership between AKDN and AFD extends to countries beyond Tanzania; including Pakistan, Kenya, Afghanistan and others. AKHS is also grateful for the grant of Euros 250,000 that it received from AFD for Palliative Care training of 8 champions from the Aga Khan Development Network Hospitals in East Africa at the Institut Curie in Paris, a world-renowned cancer facility. This training has allowed 4 cancer doctors and 4 specialized nurses to commence Palliative care programmes in Kenya and Tanzania.



LOOKING AHEAD - THE FUTURE OF AKHS,T

AKHS,T has now embarked on a significant TZS 191 billion (\$85 million) expansion of its facility - TZS 124 billion (\$55 million) loan from L'Agence Française de Développement (AFD) and AKDN grant of TZS 67 billion (\$30 million) - that will see the Aga Khan Hospital become the premier not-for-profit teaching and tertiary healthcare system in Tanzania.

FOCUS ON NATIONAL HEALTH PRIORITIES

Phase II expansion of the Aga Khan Hospital is fully aligned with national priorities and the growing burden of disease, particularly Non Communicable Diseases (NCD), and is based on consultations and at the request of the Government of Tanzania.

The expansion, which will be completed by mid-2018, will enhance programmes in cardiology, oncology, neurosciences and critical care. Maternal, neonatal and child health is another key focus area and the Phase II expansion will see advanced facilities and programmes in these specialties.



A STATE OF THE ART FACILITY

170 beds and 6 new operating theatres along with advanced diagnostic facilities will see the establishment of a state of the art academic medical centre that will act as a referral hospital, train healthcare professionals and be a catalyst in promoting evidence based and best international practices.

As part of the expansion, 35 additional outreach health facilities across Tanzania will also be established by 2020. AKHS,T will spend TZS 2.7 billion (\$1.2 million) in specialized training of healthcare professionals.


